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## Saint Mark Baptist Church, Arkansas Advocates for Children and Families Host Documentary Screening and Discussion on Maternal Mortality

Little Rock, AR (March 20, 2023)— In recognition of April as Minority Health Month and Black Maternal Health Week April 11-17, Saint Mark Baptist Church (Saint Mark) and Arkansas Advocates for Children and Families (AACF) will host a screening of <u>Aftershock</u> on **Tuesday**, **April 11 at 6pm at Saint Mark Baptist Church**, **5722 W. 12**<sup>th</sup> **St**. Following the documentary screening, there will be a discussion about Black maternal mortality in Arkansas with Dr. Creshelle Nash, the Arkansas Blue Cross Blue Shield medical director for Health Equity and Public Programs; and Dr. William "Sam" Greenfield, Arkansas Department of Health medical director and UAMS professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology. The discussion will include topics such as access to maternal healthcare, affordable healthcare accessibility, and the role of community organizations. This event is free and open to the public.

Aftershock brings attention to the alarming rate of Black maternal mortality in the United States and explores the racial disparities in healthcare access and treatment, systemic racism, and the trauma Black mothers experience during childbirth and pregnancy. Arkansas ranks as one of the worst states in America for maternal health. A 2021 Department of Health report showed Black mothers were more than two times as likely to die as white mothers during pregnancy. In the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's 2018 comparison of 26 states with available data, Arkansas had the highest maternal mortality ratio.

"Our health ministry is pleased to partner with AACF to bring this powerful documentary and discussion to our community," said Dr. Phillip L. Pointer, Sr., Senior Pastor of Saint Mark Baptist Church. "It is crucial that we shine a light on the devastating effects of healthcare inequities on Black maternal health and take action to address these disparities."

"There are several factors that contribute to the extremely poor maternal health outcomes in Arkansas, including high poverty rates and inadequate obstetric care in rural parts of the state," said Keesa Smith, AACF executive director. "We are hopeful that conversations like these, as well as continued advocacy at the state level to invest additional resources in rural communities, doctors can save more expectant mothers' lives."
